### New & Notable




#### ZOOM Collection

It's never too late to Zoom-Zoom-Zoom-a-Zoom! Happy 53rd birthday to the children's program that raised generations.

Produced by GBH in Boston, ZOOM was inspired by iconic shows like *Sesame Street* and *Mr. Rogers' Neighborhood*. It originally aired from 1972 to 1978, with a reboot from 1999 to 2005. This mostly unscripted series featured a dynamic cast of young "ZOOMers" who engaged viewers with games, plays, recipes, and songs.


#### Eyes on the Prize Interviews Collection

Celebrate nearly 40 years of *Eyes on the Prize* with over 300 raw footage interviews from the American Civil Rights Movement. Produced by documentarian Henry Hampton and Blackside Inc., this collection offers an in-depth look at pivotal moments and figures.

The series, released in two parts—*America's Civil Rights Years* (1954-1965) and *America at the Racial Crossroads* (1965-1985)—garnered multiple Emmys, a Peabody, and an Academy Award nomination.

### Dig Deeper MLK: In His Own Words

### Honoring Fannie Lou Hamer



This month, [President Joe Biden awarded the Presidential Medal of Freedom](#) posthumously to Mississippi Civil Rights icon Fannie Lou Hamer. Hamer played a key role in organizing “Freedom Summer” and forming the Mississippi Freedom Democratic Party (MFDP), pivotal to the 1965 Voting Rights Act.

## In Memoriam



This month, at age 100, **President Jimmy Carter** [passed away](#), leaving a lasting mark as the longest-lived U.S. President in history. Beyond his tenure as the 39th President, Carter distinguished himself as a humanitarian, author, and Nobel Peace Prize laureate.

**Charles Person**, the youngest of the original 13 Freedom Riders, [passed away this month at the age of 83](#). A lifelong advocate for nonviolent protest and social justice, Person faced relentless violence as he and his fellow Freedom Riders tested the enforcement of the Supreme Court's *Boynton v. Virginia* ruling against segregation in interstate travel. His
